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Introduction

It would be extremely gratifying to be able to preface this data book with pronouncements of how well Montana children are doing these days, or at least with a summary of great accomplishments achieved during the past year in the area of improving child well-being. Unfortunately, in the absence of huge and sudden changes, we have to content ourselves with an overview of the areas where we are slowly making progress.

In comparing the state data published in this book to that of our data base year of 2000, a few obvious improvements emerge. These have been extensively discussed already—traffic safety, juvenile justice, adolescent immunization coverage, and health insurance coverage. However, there are areas where the gains have not been as pronounced, yet progress is being made on a continuous basis.

Particularly in the realm of youth risk and protective factors do we see improvements that, from one year to the next, appear minor, but when considered over the past decade, turn out to be quite considerable. That

youth in our state smoke less than they used to is a well-known fact; however, reduction in the use of smokeless tobacco has occurred over the years as well. Similarly, youth smoking marijuana has also gone down since 2001. These changes are less dramatic than the drop in smoking, but no less worthy of notice.

However, while the juvenile offense rate has been on a significant downward trend for a long time, we experienced an unexpected up-tick in 2012. Spread across the whole state, the increase was seen primarily in the crime categories of aggravated assault and motor vehicle theft.

Such a setback is not a reason for discounting the diversionary system currently in place in Montana. Instead, such a directional change in a long-range trend should encourage an examination of prevailing trends within the youth environment that may have encouraged such a change.

Furthermore, the up-tick may very well prove to be an anomaly, which makes it important to re-visit juvenile crime rates next year.

In the case of fatal alcohol-related crashes where the driver is under age 21, the trend varies widely—if a trend can actually be identified at all. However, looking at the larger picture of youth attitudes and perceptions indicates that this age group has become less tolerant of drinking and driving over the past decade. Additionally, fewer youth report engaging in this type of behavior.

Clearly, current approaches are making a difference in creating a larger culture that supports healthy behavioral choices, and a clear downward trend in the number of deaths caused by intoxicated under-age drivers may be right around the corner.

Finally, as you are reading this, you may wonder what happened to the "2013" Montana KIDS COUNT data book. After some debate, we decided that it would be more meaningful to date our data book for the year of publication. The most current data years vary by indicator source, which makes it impossible to name the data book according to the date of the data within it. Consequently, as this data book is being published in 2014, we are calling it the "2014 Montana KIDS" COUNT Data Book". We're sorry if this causes confusion, but keep in mind that "...confusion is a place where we have greater access to wisdom (Karen Wright)". Let's channel that wisdom into our work to better the lives of children in Montana.

BREASTFEEDING

Protecting, promoting and supporting breastfeeding is an important strategy to improve the health of mothers and their children. Breastfeeding protects babies from infections and illnesses, including diarrhea, ear infections and pneumonia, and babies that are breastfed are also less likely to develop asthma, less likely to become obese, and less likely to die of Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS). Additionally, mothers who breastfeed their babies have a decreased risk of breast and ovarian cancers.

Breastfeeding initiation rates continue to rise across the country, as do rates for breastfeeding at 6 months and breastfeeding at 12 months. As another positive development, a growing number of hospitals and birth centers across the country are found to support breastfeeding. Birth facility policies and practices significantly impact whether a woman chooses to start breastfeeding and how long she continues the practice.

Notes: TANF is an assistance program made up of three components 1) The Job Supplement Program (JSP) provides options to a cash grant such as Medicaid coverage, child care assistance or a one-time employment-related payment; 2) The Pathways Program, a time limited monthly cash grant and opportunities leading to self-sufficiency; and 3) the Community Services Program (CSP), a cash assistance program designed for individuals who have used all of their Pathways benefits but have not achieved self-sufficiency.

SNAP is a program to supplement the food costs of low income households with food stamps that are redeemable for groceries. There are two kinds of assistance: Public-Assistance (households in which all members receive income from TANF or SSI) and Non-Assistance (all other). SNAP used to be known as the Food Stamps Program.

Best Beginnings Child Care Scholarships help pay for child care for working families whose

income is at or below 150% FPL, and to families who participate in TANF. All participants pay a co-payment based on a sliding fee scale.

In Montana, a child qualifies for CHIP if family income is too high to qualify for Medicaid, but less than 250% of FPL.

Children's Medicaid provides medical benefits to low-income people with inadequate or no medical insurance. The Federal government establishes general guidelines for the program, while program requirements are set by each state. Eligibility for children is based on the child's status, not its parents', and is set at 100% FPL.
