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

Introduction

During the past few years, Montana families and children have experienced a range of positive developments. As the data in this book indicate, Montana children overall are doing better than they were 10 or even 5 years ago. Our state has seen improvements in a variety of areas, including better health insurance coverage, lower child and teen death rates, lower substance abuse rates, lower teen birth rates, and higher graduation rates.

These improvements are noticeable for all groups of Montana children—white, American Indian and Hispanic/Latino. However, because initial levels of well-being vary by race and ethnicity, across-the-board improvements do not change disparity gaps. With improvement that is the same across racial and ethnic groups, the well-being of children of color will continue to lag behind that of white children. To achieve similar levels of well-being and opportunity as white children – to effectively close the gap – children of color need access to opportunities that let them improve more.

Montana KIDS COUNT is part of the national KIDS COUNT network, funded by the Annie E. Casey Foundation. The foundation's mission is to ensure that "all kids in the United States have a bright future" by using data-informed policy solutions. Increasingly, data serve to highlight ways in which systemic and structural barriers are propagated for people of color in today's society. These barriers, whether intentional or unintentional, hamper efforts to support a future that is equally bright for all children. As we strive to provide equal opportunity, we are failing to close the gap between white children and children of color².

One solution to closing the disparity gap is to ensure that children have the varying resources necessary to succeed equally, instead of focusing on all children having equal resources in order to succeed.

Public dialogue is gradually shifting from addressing inequality among children to addressing inequity. The two concepts reflect two different approaches to providing opportunity for America's children: equality means each child has access to the same resources, while equity means that each child has access to the resources they need to learn and thrive³. Put differently, equality means that all children get a shirt, while equity means everyone gets a shirt that fits.

Inequity exists in all areas of the human experience. However, the main determinant of inequity in child well-being is a child's race and ethnicity. In Montana, the consequences of inequity in the opportunities afforded to American Indian children and those available to white children are alarmingly noticeable.

Differences in opportunity are evident starting in the earliest years of a child's life, where children of color grow up in environments that too often hinder healthy development.

For example, health insurance coverage for white Montana children under the age of 5 is 96%, compared to 77% for American Indian children of the same age. Disparity resulting from inequity in health care access is evident in health outcomes, as more American Indian babies than white babies are born pre-term, are born at low birth weight and are born to mothers who did not receive adequate prenatal care. Babies born pre-term are also more likely to have health challenges as they grow older. Inequity in educational opportunities maintain gaps in scholastic achievement. Only 13% of American Indian 8th graders test as proficient readers, compared to 41% of white youth⁴. Children who struggle academically are less likely to graduate on time, pursue postsecondary education and obtain employment that pays well as adults. By extension, the unemployment rate for white adults is 4.3%, while for American Indian adults it is 20%.

Furthermore, public systems designed to help children and families succeed have historically functioned in ways that deny opportunity to people of color⁵. Many of our institutions, beliefs and cultural norms operate in ways that limit opportunity for children of color. These are forces that have become normalized and legitimized over time, through custom, practice and policy⁶. We cannot afford to ignore the continued existence of these fundamental inequities, lest we allow them to continue to weaken our social fabric. Our country is becoming increasingly diverse and our future prosperity, global competitiveness and community strength, depend more and more on the success of all children, rather than the success of just one group.

In Montana, such success relies on the equity of opportunity afforded to our children, including American Indian children and our growing population of Hispanic/Latino children. A system that builds and maintains barriers for non-white families and children threatens our universal right to "justice for all."

Montana KIDS COUNT envisions a future where improving the outcomes for ALL children is a top priority for our state. To achieve this, policy changes must be made. Planning, budget and policy decisions must be rooted in data and research, which is why we work to provide "state legislators, public officials and child advocates with the reliable data, policy recommendations and tools needed to advance sound policies that benefit children and families."⁷

We hope that our new logo, with its mountains and trend lines, serves to remind users of these key facts and principles.

BREASTFEEDING

Protecting, promoting and supporting breastfeeding is an important strategy to improve the health of mothers and their children. Breastfeeding protects babies from infections and illnesses, including diarrhea, ear infections and pneumonia, and babies that are breastfed are also less likely to develop asthma, less likely to become obese, and less likely to die of Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS). Additionally, mothers who breastfeed their babies have a decreased risk of breast and ovarian cancers.

Breastfeeding initiation rates continue to rise across the country, as do rates for breastfeeding at 6 months and breastfeeding at 12 months. As another positive development, a growing number of hospitals and birth centers across the country are found to support breastfeeding. Birth facility policies and practices significantly impact whether a woman chooses to start breastfeeding and how long she continues the practice.

<u>Adoption</u> Children who have been removed from their own families due to abuse, neglect or other family problems that make it unsafe for them to remain at home, become available for adoption if the rights of their parents have been terminated. Adoption is generally the permanency plan of choice when a court terminates parental rights, because adoption offers a child a lifetime link to a family.

Notes: <u>TANF</u> is an assistance program made up of three components 1) The Job Supplement Program (JSP) provides options to a cash grant such as Medicaid coverage, child care assistance or a one-time employment-related payment; 2) The Pathways Program, a time limited monthly cash grant and opportunities leading to self-sufficiency; and 3) the Community Services Program (CSP), a cash assistance program designed for individuals who have used all of their Pathways benefits but have not achieved self-sufficiency.

<u>SNAP</u> is a program to supplement the food costs of low income households with food stamps that are redeemable for groceries. There are two kinds of assistance: Public-Assistance (households in which all members receive income from TANF or SSI) and Non-Assistance (all other). SNAP used to be known as the Food Stamps Program. <u>Best Beginnings Child Care Scholarships</u> help pay for child care for working families whose income is at or below 150% FPL, and to families who participate in TANF. All participants pay a co-payment based on a sliding fee scale.

Notes: HMK is the combination of the state's two health insurance programs for lowincome children, Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) and children's Medicaid. The numbers for each are combined into one enrollment figure for the entire program. CHIP is a federal/state partnership that expands health insurance to children whose families earn an income that is too high to qualify for Medicaid, but not high enough to purchase private insurance. In Montana, a child qualifies for CHIP if family income is too high to qualify for Medicaid, but less than 250% of the FPL.

Children's Medicaid provides medical benefits to low-income people with inadequate or no medical insurance. The Federal government establishes general guidelines for the program, while program requirements are set by each state. Eligibility for children is based on the child's status, not its parents', and is set at 100% of the FPL.
